## A joint-agency initiative against organised crime in Södertälje

**Abstract** 

This paper will describe one of the biggest criminal investigations in Swedish history, but

above all the establishment of one the most ambitious joint-agency initiative against organised

crime, named TORE 2.

The growing problems with criminal networks in the municipality of Södertälje, situated in

the Stockholm County, have been acknowledged and talked about for at least 20 years.

Likewise, the operations of these criminal networks have been reflected through an increasing

numbers of homicides, venture on homicide, assault and battery etc. After a period of some

very spectacular homicides the local and regional police were determined to form a joint

problem scenario. In order to proceed local and regional police were opted to establish a

sustainable joint-agency initiative with operational breadth and depth.

The ground thesis is that the stronger the connection between individuals in a criminal

network, the larger the risk that the person can be recruited to criminal activities. For example

connections/bounds can be ethnicity or relationship and another can be common criminal

infringement. According to researchers, ethnicity is not essential for creating local based

criminal networks, but in the municipality of Södertälje we can see that ethnicity combined

with a common residential area and the local school environment have formed a seedbed for

an impulsive, but also in some aspects, a mature criminal network.

So far, many of the success factors of TORE 2 derive from establishing a joint problem

scenario as well as a joint target perspective. Other success factors are derived to

sustainability, operational depth, and a ambitious information and mass media strategy. The

joint-agency initiative is still on-going and will be evaluated in the autumn of 2013.
